INTRODUCTION

he Kerr Wildlife Management Area is located in the northwest part of Kerr County, 12 miles west of Hunt, Texas, on F.M. 1340. The Area contains 6,493 acres purchased in 1950 by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

It is drained by the North Fork of the Guadalupe River, which forms part of the area's southern border. The topography is gently rolling to very hilly. Most drainages on the area, such as Bear Creek, remain dry throughout the year except during periods of heavy rainfall. Several small springs provide the only natural permanent water sources in addition to the Guadalupe River. Soils consist of stony, fertile, non-calcareous clay soils on the redland sites; rolling hills with shallow clay soils and clay loam soils on the low, stony hill sites; and shallow clay soils on the rocky upland sites. The climate is classified as moderately moist with an annual average rainfall of 30 inches. Approximate elevation is 2,000 feet. The dominant woody vegetation consists of several oak species, juniper and some mesquite in savannahtype areas. Dense stands of juniper occur where this invader species has not been controlled. Bluestems and Texas wintergrass are the most common grasses. Forbs are fairly abundant depending on seasonal rainfall amounts.

The Kerr Wildlife Management Area supports a variety of birds which visit or are permanent residents here. This checklist contains 191 species considered part of the Area's fauna. Two species occurring on the area are listed as endangered—the Black-capped Vireo and the Golden-cheeked Warbler. It is unlawful to play tape recordings of singing males in pursuit of these species. Caution should be observed so as not to unnecessarily disturb protected species.

Col. L.R. Wolfe listed 249 species in his "Check List of Birds of Kerr County, Texas." He described Kerr County as "a dividing zone between many eastern, western and southern species of birds." This, plus the fact that fewer ecological types and terrains are represented on the management area, accounts for the lesser number of species which occur on the Kerr Area.

If you observe any birds not contained in this checklist, please notify area personnel.
